Task 1: Read a book of your choice.

Task 2: Find a 'gap' in the book: perhaps a character does something 'off-stage' or a conversation happens which we never see. It could be seeing an event from a different character's viewpoint. Produce a piece of creative writing which fills that 'gap', showing your knowledge of the text through your choices of language and structure. This should be between two and three sides of A4. It can be typed or handwritten, and can be as creative and experimental as you wish.
